**From the Office of the Chairwoman:
Fourth Quarter News Letter**

Aniin; greetings from the Chairwoman's office. As the fourth quarter of the fiscal year is wrapping up, there is a lot of exciting news to share with everyone. As this newsletter demonstrates, Leech Lake has made a great deal of progress throughout the multitude of programs and departments. The Council is excited to continue working towards building upon this progress and further resolving on-going efforts. The focus of this newsletter is to show the progress the Tribe has made this quarter through developments and collaborations.

NEW HIRES

Doris Jones has been hired as the Health Division Director. Doris has years of experience in health care, having served as the Division Director in previous administrations. Doris is an enrolled Leech Lake Band Member.

The Human Services Division Director position has been filled by

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Edward Franckowiak. Edward has valuable experience and great ideas that he is bringing to this important position and we look forward to working with him.

FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

The Council is committed to proper fiscal management and using the Band's resources responsibly. The following amounts showcase the Band's financial success over the past year despite the Federal Sequestration. Revenues have increased by over \$3 million and expenses have decreased by \$6.3 million. Therefore, the bottom line this year went up by \$9.4 million!

Furthermore, we are committed and determined to improve health and human services to our Band members. This includes our responsibility to make these services financially sustainable through an efficient billing and financial management process. The plan is to have this concept thoroughly outlined, and designed for implementation by January 2014. Current Health and Human Services billing specialists will be made stronger at identifying concerns in their divisions where billing is an issue. In addition, billing staff will work closer with specific departments to bring its billing responsibilities current for formal claims reimbursement. This will have a lasting impact regarding lapses in billing responsibilities and improved eligible reimbursement claims, thus creating a greater revenue stream through a proper billing process.

EDUCATION

I testified in front of the Federal Appropriations Committee in Early Spring for more school construction funding. The efforts of the Tribal Council on behalf of the Bug-O-Nay-Ge-Shig School have made progress and brought good news for the Niigaane Immersion School. On June 24th, The Bug-O-Nay-Ge-Shig School received notice from the BIA that they were, "next on the list to receive two modular units so elementary students did not have to attend class in the same facility with high school students." The target completion date for the two units is early this fall. This project will eliminate the sewer backup problem that has forced the Niigaane program to be disrupted every year when the ground heaves due to freezing. The building is of commercial grade and will be energy efficient.

This past spring, Bug-O-Nay-Ge-Shig School and Leech Lake Tribal College held graduation ceremonies for many of our Band members. Recent Bug-O-Nay-Ge-Shig School graduates, Seneca Auginash and Karina Guinn, began an internship at the Chairwoman's office. These two interns will gain experience on how tribal government works, our policies and our procedures and how we operate. The Blandin Foundation awarded the Band a generous \$10,000.00 grant in order to compensate Seneca and Karina for their hard work. Both interns are enrolled at the Leech Lake Tribal College and will receive credits towards their college degree upon successful completion of the internship.

In Leech Lake Tribal College news, the proposed groundbreaking will be held in August for the new Tribal College library project. Without more classroom space, the Tribal College will not be able to offer enough classes to meet the growing student body. Building a new library will free up a large enough space for two more classrooms allowing a significant scheduling flexibility. The new library will also house the Tribal College's successful Learning Center/Peer Tutoring Center. As it is, about 20% of the library collection currently sits in storage because of a lack of space. The new library will allow books covering Indian law, historical records, and other Leech Lake related materials. The Tribal College library will also be open to all community members.



SOVEREIGNTY

Previously the Band was under IRS scrutiny. Leech Lake and many other tribes took a stance against the targeted taxation of tribal assistance programs. The IRS has stopped all audits on the general welfare exclusion doctrine due to the fact that Tribes across the nation and Leech Lake put up a fight regarding the taxing of band members for assistance that they have received. However, due to continued IRS scrutiny the Leech Lake Tribal Council will no longer have line items available. This leads into the new transition of Leech Lake's assistance program: Tribal Referral has just recently updated their policies and procedures and they will be handling all assistance for the Band members from now on.

As of today the Band has not reached an agreement with the State of Minnesota on the tobacco issues surrounding the tribal state tax agreement. Leech Lake and Red Lake are the only two tribes in Minnesota that have not renewed their compact with the state. The Band is still taking the stance that we should be able to sell the native brand cigarettes on the reservation with the Leech Lake tribal stamp only, rather than the state tax stamp. The Tribal Council is determined to stand our ground for what is best for the band members and tribal sovereignty.

Recently we have received notice that the Enbridge Pipeline is considering going around the Leech Lake Reservation. With the Tribal Council being on the same page and consistent with our stance, Enbridge was unable to push their way through the reservation with a new pipeline.

INFRASTRUCTURE

As reported in our last newsletter, the Band has purchased 10 acres of land where an Assisted Living Complex will be built northwest of Cass Lake HIS grounds. The Council has approved a contract to provide architectural and engineering services in order for construction to begin. The complex will provide services for elders and vulnerable adults as well as provide spaces for health administration, laundry, a beauty shop and family/community gathering. The Council has recently allocated \$5 million towards building this 40 unit Assisted Living Complex for our community. The planning team invites community members, especially elders and healthcare providers, to participate. Please contact Economic Development at 335-4497 to learn how to get involved.

The Band has historically purchased land without any consistent guidelines or policies. Regardless of leadership changes, using consistent consolidation/acquisition guidelines would allow for land holdings growth in a predictable manner. The Land Department will follow the land acquisition priority list when acquiring land or advising other tribal entities in acquiring lands. After implementation of the land consolidation/acquisition compliance policy, the Tribal Council, with the help of the Land Department, has implemented a land purchase plan to start building and growing our land base. Recently, we have expanded the Band's land base by 292 acres this year. By consolidating our land base we open new avenues of regulatory and decision making authority.

Health and health education have become a central focus in order to positively affect the livelihood of Band members. The Leech Lake fitness center has received grant money to expand and renovate the existing complex in downtown Cass Lake. The plans include a patient room for occupational therapy, meeting/classroom for diabetes education, a new weight room, and a brand new studio for exercise classes.

COLLABORATIONS / GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

New office space has been leased in Duluth to serve Band members in that area with intake and some services. Currently we are advertising the position



and we plan on having the new office up and fully functional as soon as possible. The new office is located at 202 West 2nd Street, Duluth, MN.

Since our first meetings held last August, the Band has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between Leech Lake and the Chippewa National Forest (CNF). The importance of this MOU cannot be over emphasized because not only does it provide a framework for cooperation between the Band and CNF for natural resource management, economic development, employment and training, but this agreement also reaffirms the U.S. Forest Service's federal Indian trust responsibility to recognize tribal hunting, fishing, and gathering rights of Leech Lake Band members on U.S. Forest Service lands within Reservation boundaries. The MOU included language which states both parties will develop plans, policies, programs, techniques, and procedures that will provide for the sustainable exercise of the Band's hunting, fishing and gathering rights on lands administered by the Forest Service.

CONTINUING EFFORTS

Although we are excited about the addition of two Niigaane classrooms at the Bug-O-Nay-Ge-Shig School, we will continue lobbying and researching opportunities to improve this facility including federal funding to build a new high school. While these two Niigaane buildings will provide more floor space than the current building, there is still not enough space to meet all of the needs. More storage space and a plan for expansion will need to be developed as more students enroll in the Niigaane program.

The Council continues to negotiate strategies for a new tribal state tax agreement that includes separating the individual facets of the tax agreement that include tobacco, alcohol, and gasoline taxes. The Council will continue efforts towards increasing a greater scope of influence concerning agreements between the State and the Band as well.

In summation, we will continue working these on-going efforts through collaboration with our lobbyists, legislators, and delegates including N.I.G.A., N.C.A.I., MIGA, and a host of other State and Federal agencies to better connect with and serve the greater goals and aspirations of the Band.

Celebrating Success

The first week of June was a week of celebrations for the Bug-O-Nay-Ge-Shig School. On Wednesday, June 5, seventy four students and their chaperones travelled by school bus to Valley Fair. On the way home, they stopped for dinner at a buffet and late into the night were transported by dedicated staff to their homes. Students earned the trip by successfully completing one of three paths: 95% attendance 4th quarter; proficiency; or, improvement of one level or proficiency on the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessment (MCA); or scoring at grade level or making improvement on the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) testing. Students could test as many times as they wanted to improve their MAP test scores. From all accounts, even though it rained, the children had a good time.

The next day, Thursday, June 6 was the last day of school for students and the annual Family Picnic began at 10 a.m. on the football field. Games, activities, music, cotton candy, and a picnic lunch were provided and supervised by teachers and staff members. A closing ceremony ended the school year and served as the transition to the next event of the day.

At 6 p.m. on June 6, twelve seniors entered the school gym as students and left as the 2013 graduates of the Bug-O-Nay-Ge-Shig School. All 12 students who were on track for graduation in the fall of 2012 did, in fact, graduate. In addition to the diplomas, all the graduates received a woolen blanket, their class flower (orchids) and an eagle feather. Additionally, Tribal Chairwoman, Carrie Jones announced recipients of two internships for graduates Seneca Auginash and Katrina Guinn. This innovative summer program will provide mentorships for these two students to prepare them for college and expose them to tribal government.

While the formal school year ended on June 6, cultural education and enhancement courses continued. Culture Camp was held during the week of June 10-14. Students participated in cultural art, games, drum and dancing, archery, Lacrosse and gardening. Summer school began Monday, June 17 for two weeks to provide academic enrichment in reading and math as well as credit recovery for students who need high school credits toward graduation.

The Bug-O-Nay-Ge-Shig School and the Niigaane Immersion School provide unique K-12 educational opportunities for students who are interested in learning core academics through study of the Ojibwe language and culture. BIE announces AYP status for Bug O Nay Ge Shig School

On June 6, the Bug-O-Nay-Ge-Shig School received notice from the Bureau of Indian Education in Albuquerque, New Mexico that the school made Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) for the 2012 school year. The school has not made AYP for several years and has been working to improve and enhance educational opportunities for students. The BIE reviews student test scores, attendance rates and graduation rates to determine whether schools are making adequate yearly progress and compares the scores to other tribal schools across 26 different states.

The Bug-O-Nay-Ge-Shig School is a fully accredited tribal grant school of the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe. It is nestled in the Chippewa National Forest and incorporates the daily curriculum into the study of the Anishinaabe culture and language. The seven values of Love, Respect, Wisdom, Humility, Bravery, Honesty, and Truth are the pillars upon which students in grades kindergarten through twelfth grade study traditional academics as well as seasonal activities, drum and dance, Native American art and Ojibwe. Students in grades K-6 also have the option of attending the nationally renowned Niigaane language immersion program where instruction is delivered entirely in Ojibwe.

The mission of the Bug-O-Nay-Ge-Shig School is to provide quality education and promote healthy community through lifelong learners. 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2013 Youth Gathering of Native Americans Report

Providing an opportunity for youth to be engaged with the community capacity building process of the Opichi Wadiswan project was the reason for this gathering of the youth. The targeted age group was 8-20 years of age, which is the targeted age group for the project to implement strategies. Rational for identifying this as a capacity building activity is because we wanted to create awareness of the harms of underage substance abuse while creating an opportunity for youth to experience and a link that illustrates “culture is prevention”. We also wanted to solicit strengths and challenges through the eyes of our youth regarding underage substance use and the strengths of our Anishinabe ways of life. The model that was used was called Gathering of Native Americans (GONA) and is an evidence-based practice across Indian Country and recognized by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration (SAMHSA).

During the planning process for the event, the work group put together a plan to identify partnerships and who was responsible for each task. Several Tribal Government divisions participated to help make this event successful. A letter of invitation and packet of information was provided to partners to explain the nature of the event. Partners include:

- Leech Lake Tribal Police Department
- Leech Lake Youth Division
- Leech Lake Opiate Treatment Program
- Leech Lake A & D Program – Halfway House & Adolescent Program
- Leech Lake Tribal Court

- Leech Lake Tribal Council
- KOJB – Tribal Radio
- Leech Lake Human Services Opichi Wadiswan Project
- Native American Center for Excellence
- Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration
- Debahjimon Tribal Newspaper

Each partner was part of the planning/work group; they donated funds for the event, provided meeting space, committed staff time, helped with outreach and marketing, and/or ensured youth were transported. Without this collaboration and commitment to youth in our Tribal area this event would not have been possible.

We would like to share with you the information that was provided to us by the youth.

Each day was opened by a traditional pipe ceremony and songs from the drum. One of the most important items for youth during this event was to strengthen their voice. The kids experienced group activities and opportunities to present their group work each day in the circle.

Each person in attendance was provided the opportunity to experience offering asema (tobacco) to the fire for prayer each day. Guidance & Teachings were provided by Elders in attendance.

Part of the team work was to create cloth shields that represented the strengths of the Anishinabe culture; utilizing art and craft materials, youth worked on these items throughout the four days. The cloth shields were provided to the Youth Division and they will be able to get them framed.

The youth were asked to work in their groups and identify A, what broke apart our world at Leech Lake?, and B, what will hold our world together at Leech Lake?, We chose to perceive these as risk and protective factors.

The results were about what you would figure. Our youth are incredibly smart and they see what is going on in our communities, in some cases better than the adults.

What broke our world apart includes things like alcohol and drug abuse, but the kids also outlined things such as a lack of education and employment opportunities.

In conclusion, it is very clear that our children and youth are exposed to a large degree of trauma. On day three, the youth were provided with an opportunity to do role playing. The youth chose from the topics of domestic violence, grieving, suicide, teen pregnancy, underage drinking and violence of Indian vs. Indian. An important note about this process is that two of the groups chose to role play suicide. This was disheartening to say the least. The youth knew how to role-play this situation. What does this tell us?

It is also important to mention how essential it is to meet our children, youth and even adults where they are at in their process of healing, learning and experiencing Anishinabe lifeways. The GONA process acknowledges four basic stages of human development and because of the structure the curriculum provides, we were able to easily comprehend and adapt the curriculum and utilize our Tribal areas traditional teachings.

It is very comforting to see and read about the youth saying they believe that spirituality and the Anishinabe way of life is important and that they want to know and learn more about it, especially the language. The responses regarding “What broke apart Leech Lake?” and “What will put Leech Lake back together?” are consistent with other items in our community assessment and epidemiology profile. *They are telling us the answer; here are the problems and here are the solutions.* Our children and youth get it. We just need to listen to them and keep providing opportunities and experiences to continue to learn the language and culture, so they can be invisible to alcohol, drugs and other risks. This is what will increase their developmental assets for their future and seven generations beyond.

We would like to say Chi-Miigwetch to the Elders that committed their time for this event.

Fish Stocking Cutfoot River

The stocking of fish into lakes is a tool utilized by resource managers in an attempt to increase fish populations. The first question fisheries managers must ask themselves when considering stocking is; **Why has the population of a fish changed?**

The answer to these questions can vary widely depending on the situation.

In some cases fish populations naturally fluctuate and this is completely normal and for some species it is probably necessary. A lake is a very complex system and it is only capable of producing so many pounds per acres of fish. This can be low number of many species of fish, or higher numbers of a few species. It can be few number of large fish, or larger numbers of small fish. In the case of most lakes on the Leech Lake Reservation it is a complex array of up to 42 species of fish in a host of age classes. These fish, and the insects, and other invertebrates they feed on are what is called a "food web". This web is constantly in flux and when one species declines another one quickly fills the void and utilized the energy or food available. For example when you

have lost of walleye in a lake they will be reduced numbers of yellow perch and shiners, the major food source for this species. When you get to the point where there is not enough food available for walleye their growth will decline as will there numbers allowing the perch and shiners to increase.

In some cases fish populations have become reduced due to human harvest that is in excess of what a fish population can support. Human harvest is a significant source of mortality in many waters and the reason we have open and closed season and bag limits for many species. In some cases this effectively manages fish populations, and in others it does not. Part of the difficulty in managing human harvest is that not all fish are created equal in terms of fish populations. This all has to do with weather or not fish mortality is compensatory or additive in nature.

Compensatory morality is "natural" morality. By this we mean that fish, especially young fish, die in huge number due to a whole host of causes. This can be everything from disease, lack of food, siltation, they can be eaten by insects and invertebrates, consumed by birds or mammals, pollution, and then these fish face the biggest source of mortality which is being eaten by other fish. No one can tell you just how many fish this is and it can vary from lake to lake and even year to year, but it is safe to say that the vast

majority of all small fish of all species die each year with most of them being eaten by other fish. If you think about this from a simple population level a female fish, or any other species for that manner, only need to produce two offspring (one that replaces her and one that replaces her mate) that also survive to success reproduce for a population to be stable. If the survival rate is even slightly higher than this the population will increase and slightly worse will result in a population declining. As mortality in a fish population is very high they tend to produce many eggs to compensate for high mortality. A female walleye that weighs about 5 pounds will produce about 200,000 eggs per year. But of these on a very small number will make it to catchable size.

Getting back to mortality the other type of mortality is additive mortality. This is mortality that is in excess of what would naturally occur. This is typically where humans pay a big roll. Once a fish reaches a size of 6-8 inches in length it has survived most compensatory mortality because there are not a whole lot of things that will eat fish of these sizes. Although these fish continue to experience a certain amount of natural mortality per year and a few may even die of old age it is at levels much lower than what they experience when they were small.

Boy River Bridge Project

As a direct result from lobbying efforts in Washington D.C., the District II Representative and staff has helped secure funding from the Federal Highway Administration with a contribution from the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe as well. Cass County will help with the design and inspection during construction. Construction is anticipated to begin in mid to late August and is expected to carry over into late June of 2014. Sometimes problems can arise when trying to pour concrete in cold conditions as well as limitations on working in the



river channel in the spring due to fish spawn etc. The new bridge project involves replacing the existing bridge with a new model that will include a ten foot sidewalk on the east side of the bridge and a five foot sidewalk on the west side of the bridge as well as providing for a twelve foot parking

shoulder on the east side of the road both north and south of the bridge. A temporary two-lane bypass will be built in order to keep the roadway open to traffic during construction and to not cause delays.

Bena Pavillion Project

The original planning team for the Bena Pavilion has been given the green light to begin construction. It was discussed at Local Indian Council meetings that the community was in need of a family picnic area. The community envisioned a wooded lakeside area with access to Lake Winnebigoishish for family outings and community events. Construction and clearing will begin toward the end of summer 2013. A huge thank to Levi Brown, Environmental Specialist Leech Lake Division of

Resource Management (DRM) for negotiating with the State Land Department and securing the property needed to pursue this project.

Summer Food Program

The Kego Lake Local Indian Council, Leech Lake Early Childhood, Community Services and the District II office collaborated to improve the participation numbers for the Summer Food Program. The community is scattered in a rural area near the town of Longville. The Summer Food Program provides free meals for seven weeks to all children eighteen and under and any adult that wishes to purchase a meal. The Program is funded through the State of Minnesota and depends greatly upon participant numbers. After much thought and several discussions the Local Indian Council and Early Childhood Division decided to serve a picnic lunch twice a week on Tuesdays and Thursdays at the Boy Lake Community recreational area. The District 2 office connected with the Community Services Department and provided two large picnic tables for the program.

Birthday Recognition for Reservation Elders 62 and older

Inspired by District I office staff, the District II office will now begin recognizing the elders, 62 and older, on their birthday month with Buffett coupons and Slot play to Northern Lights Casino. July birthdays will be mailed on July 15th, all others will be mailed on the 15th of each month. We appreciate our elders and look forward to feed back on the coupons.



Leech Lake Tribal Police Department Recognizes Current and former Employees

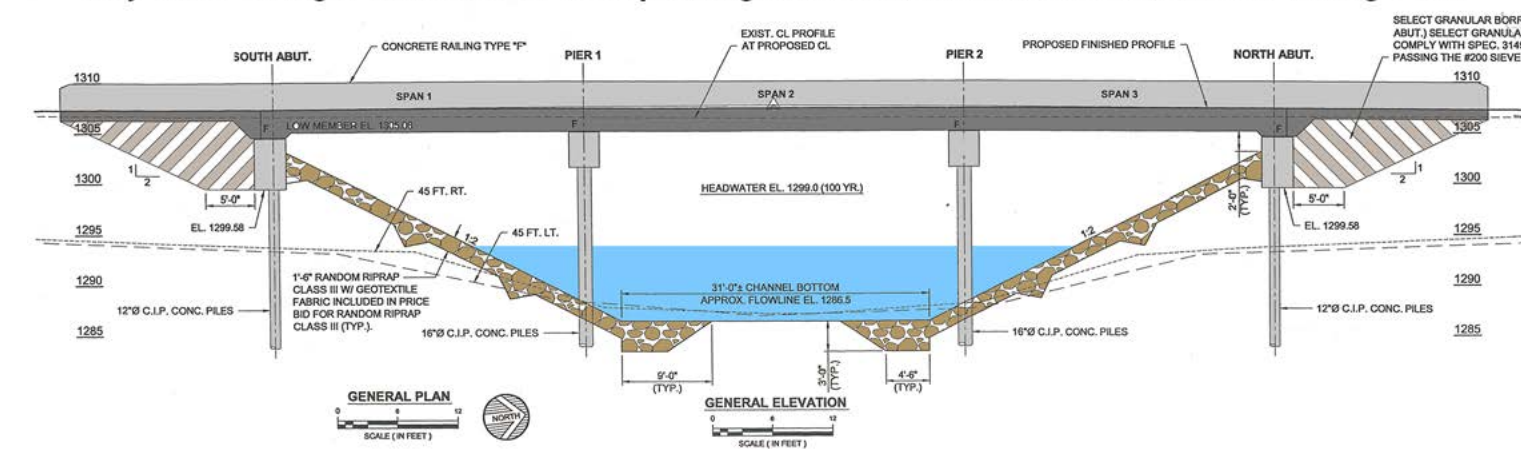
Community Service Officer Rory Haaland is recognized for his Outstanding Community Collaboration and Outreach for securing Animal Clinics brought to all residents of the Leech Lake Reservation. These are primarily volunteer services of the Leech Lake Legacy (a non-for-profit). An estimation of volunteer time and other services related totaled approximately \$60,000. C.S.O.-Haaland also secured a mini-grant through the A.S.P.C.A. - which has been utilized to purchase equipment to perform his daily duties and tasks.

Leech Lake Sergeant Scott Kellar was recognized for his efforts with grant writing collaboration and securing funding in the amount of \$991,000. These funds have allowed the Leech Lake Police Department to make purchases such as squad cars, radios, bullet proof vests and other much needed items that aren't part of the general funds budget.

Narcotics Investigator Rick Wuori (a former employee of the LLLPD) was recognized for his efforts in grant writing collaboration in the amount of 991,000.
